Go To Phoenix


In March I had the chance to travel to Phoenix. I was able to visit family, take in a spring training game and have some fun. I also took the opportunity to visit the National thrift store and the Phoenix Diocesan Council offices.

The director of the National Store gave me a tour of his store. A lot bigger than any of ours and jammed pack full of items to sell. When he took it over it was losing \$20,000 each month, but now turns a profit. He did this by getting the employees on board with his vision and got them working efficiently.

The Phoenix Diocesan Council is the largest in the United States with 81 conferences and over 3,500 Vincentians. It extends from Phoenix to Kingman, which is a three-hour drive. Its campus encompasses 11 acres. It has a chapel, shelter, dining room, medical clinic, dental clinic, community garden and a kitchen that prepares 4,000 meals every day.

They have regularly scheduled tours every Wednesday at 3:30. I was the only participant. They gave me a bunch of their literature, a 144-page book on the history of their council and a Vincentian Life shirt. I think they were only being nice to me because they want to come here and have me take them to a Diamondbacks – Giants baseball game!

I strongly recommend adding Arizona to your travel plans and stopping in to check them out. They show what is possible if you just strive to improve a little every couple of years. If anyone wants to borrow the book on their history let me know.



St. John Vianney: Rental Assistance and the Pandemic

The Pandemic has challenged all of us in many ways, especially when it comes to helping those we serve to stay in their homes and to avoid eviction. Rule 1.6 of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul tells us that we must strive for renewal, constantly adapting to the ever-changing world conditions; that we must seek to be ever aware of the changes that occur in human society and the new types of poverty that may be identified or anticipated. All of our conferences have done our best to do just that – to adapt to our changing world conditions to meet the needs of those we serve during this challenging time.

At St. John Vianney Conference, we moved quickly to address the crisis of eviction. Eight of our members quickly stepped up to form a rent team. We attended the rent assistance training offered by the District and quickly learned how to help our neighbors apply for rent assistance through Seasons of Sharing, Catholic Charities, various grant organizations, and through the Hope Conference. Since the rules were constantly changing, we tried our best to stay on top of the changing eviction moratorium rules and tenant rights. We worked many tireless hours with families to obtain over \$110,000 in rent assistance.

Recently, we have had another opportunity to adapt, as the State of California has stepped in to provide the following rent and utility assistance:

Camps and Missions A Great Way to Connect

I have participated in Protestant prayers, Buddhist Chants and Muslim Prayers. It is appropriate to encourage folks to have and find a faith home. Many Vincentians experience wonderful prayers that are offered by our neighbors in need. As Vincentians, we pray before, during and after home visits. We recognize our Lord Jesus Christ and do have an opportunity to share our faith.

Considering families that the St. Bonaventure Conference have walked with, I have seen many examples of folks coming back to church and faith.

There have been a number of children from families we served that have attended St Bonaventure Summer Bible Camp. The week long experience includes prayer, bible stories, games, crafts, Christian songs and helps establish a sense of community. Pre-COVID-19, there were close to 600 participants for the week.

The campers are through the 5th grade. Sixth graders are in transition and 7th and older youth act as counselors for the youth and supported by adult leaders. Close to 20 children, teens, and grandchildren of families aided by SVdP have attended by invitation and received scholarships to participate. Close to a dozen high school age teens from our families in need have participated in the week long La Morita Mexico Youth Mission (once called St. Agnes Mexico Mission) sponsored by Catholics mostly from the Concord Deanery.

They build homes for (and with) families in Mexico with daily faith sharing and prayer to build a Christian community. Children from a family that had been away from church, who participated in one of the missions in Mexico, returned to be baptized and confirmed at an Easter Vigil.

Neighbors we have served have attended mass with us and I see some of them participate in Holy Communion. There is no expectation for this. We bring our faith and the rest is in God's hands to touch their hearts.

aware of the benefits, resources and opportunities that are available for the poor. The Society also offers members higher training in order to better help to raise the cultural and social level of those who request this support.”



Tuesdays with Vincent The Congregation of the Mission

On June 1st, Tuesdays with Vincent will focus on the topic of “The Congregation of the Mission,” and how St. Vincent de Paul brought people together to help those in need.

Presenter Bio: Rev. Thomas F. McKenna, C.M.



Thomas F. McKenna has been a member of the Congregation of the Mission since 1963. He grew up in Brooklyn, New York and attended schools there, in New Jersey and in Pennsylvania until his ordination in 1970.

He received an M.A. in philosophy from St. John’s University in New York in 1973 and a Th. M. from Mary Immaculate Seminary in Northampton, Pennsylvania in 1974.

He spent fifteen years in seminary work including time as the Director of Novices for the Eastern Province of the Vincentians, as well as Rector of their college seminary in Niagara Falls, New York.

He earned a doctorate in systematic theology from the Catholic University of America in 1982. For ten years, he taught Spirituality as a tenured member of the theology department at St. John’s University. He has published a book on St. Vincent de Paul, articles in various theological journals and has been involved in retreat work nationally and internationally, especially within the Vincentian Family.

For more than twenty years he was part of his Congregation’s leadership team, serving as the Assistant Provincial then as Provincial completing his term in 2008.

Since then, he has taught theology at Tangaza University in Nairobi, Kenya, and also at Niagara University. Additionally, at Niagara he functioned as Assistant to the President for Mission. For six years he served in St. Louis as the Provincial Director of the St. Louise Province of the Daughters of Charity. Most recently he has worked as Formation Director for the Vincentian major seminarians in Philadelphia as well as again taking up the role of Assistant Provincial.

The Congregation of the Mission

In order that he might better respond to a wide variety of needs, St. Vincent de Paul brought together as many people as he could, rich and poor, humble and powerful, and used every means to inspire in them a sensitivity to the poor, who are the privileged image of Christ. He moved them to help the poor directly and indirectly (Constitutions of the Congregation of the Mission, Introduction, p.19).

The purpose of the Congregation of the Mission is to follow Christ evangelizing the poor. This purpose is achieved when, faithful to St. Vincent, the members individually and collectively: (1) make every effort to put on the spirit of Christ himself (Common Rules I:3) in order to acquire a holiness appropriate to their vocation (Common Rules XII:13); (2) work at evangelizing the poor, especially the more abandoned; (3) help the clergy and laity in their formation and lead them to a fuller participation in the evangelization of the poor (Constitutions, #1).


From the time of its founder, the members of the Congregation of the Mission recognized that they had been called by God to continue the mission of evangelizing those persons who are poor.
